

The International Foundation Programme at the University of Reading offers international students without British A level qualifications or the equivalent, the opportunity to prepare for undergraduate studies on our beautiful campus.

Our long established reputation for academic excellence and student support means that well motivated and hard-working students will have a head start at joining undergraduate programmes here at Reading or other leading institutions.

## Programme overview

The IFP prepares students for undergraduate study in three ways:

- provides academic training in subjects related to your chosen pathway
- develops your English language abilities
- gives you the transferable academic skills needed for undergraduate studies and beyond.

We offer pathways to the majority of degrees at the University of Reading<sup>3</sup>. A small number of degrees require students to pass an interview or psychometric assessment, and we prepare students fully for these.

Students who have met the English language progression requirements for their chosen degree take three 40 credit academic subjects. Students who have not yet met the English language requirements for their chosen degree study 40 credits of English and 80 credits in academic subjects. In addition, all students study 20 credits of Academic skills.

We typically have students from over 30 different countries on our programme. Students leave the IFP well prepared for the academic challenges they will face on their degree course with friendships that will last a lifetime and at ease with life both on campus and in the UK.



## **ACCOMMODATION**

At Reading we offer a wide range of accommodation options. Our halls provide you with a home away from home where you will find yourself part of a supportive community. Each hall has its own distinctive character offering a safe and secure environment in which to study, socialise and relax. We also run a halls liaison scheme with designated IFP tutors ensuring that our students are settled and happy in their accommodation.

The benefits of living in halls accommodation include:

# 4-YEAR LLB LAW WITH INTEGRATED FOUNDATION YEAR


Students can seek a single visa for the duration of the course.

Through the provision of high-quality teaching that is sympathetic to the needs of students from a wide range of educational backgrounds, the IFP programme will equip you with the subject specific and general study skills you need to cope with the demands of undergraduate study. Students who qualify to progress from the foundation year (Part 0) will automatically be entered into Part One of LLB Law. In addition to gaining legal knowledge, the LLB Law programme will develop your ability to:

- delineate and evaluate issues
- select relevant materials and produce arguments encompassing policy, existing practice and knowledge
- theorise and critique legal concepts and the law itself.

The degree aims to provide coverage of the core areas of English law – including public and private law – while also allowing you the flexibility to focus on your own interests.



## **JANUARY ENTRY**

The International Foundation Programme has two possible entry points. In addition to our well-established September – June programme, we also offer a January – August IFP.

#### **MODULES**

The January-start programme offers the same quality and benefits of the established IFP in a slightly more intensive format. We believe that this additional entry point provides greater flexibility to qualified and motivated students needing a foundation pathway. Successful completion of this seven-month programme can guarantee<sup>1</sup> a place on an undergraduate degree programme in October of the same year. Modules available are:

## INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION AND LANGUAGE PROGRAMME (IFLP)

A full time, campus-based programme, offering all the advantages of the existing IFP to students with a lower English level.

#### About the International Foundation and Language Programme (IFLP)

The IFLP is a 4-term 180-credit extended international foundation programme designed with an emphasis on improving your English language and academic study skills.

There are 2 entry points, one in July and one in September. The July start IFLP joins the September Entry IFP and the September start IFLP joins the January Entry IFP.

## What does the International Foundation and Language Programme offer?

In Term 1 you will focus on improving your English and developing your study skills, and then you will move on to your chosen degree pathway on either the September IFP or January IFP for the remainder of the programme.

## INTERNATIONAL ENGLISH

In order to qualify to proceed to the degree programme of their choice, students must have achieved the following level of English on completion of the Foundation Programme:

- IELTS 8.0 (with no skill below 7.0) for a degree in Speech and Language Therapy
- $\bullet$  IELTS 7.0 or 60% IELTS 7.0 or 60% in International English for most Arts and Humanities degrees
- IELTS 6.5 or 55% in International English for most degrees including Law and Henley Business School programmes, except for BA International Business and Management which requires IELTS 7.5 or 65% in International English.

Students whose English is below the undergraduate entry requirement at the start of the International Foundation Programme will be required to take the 40-credit International English module.

By the end of the module, it is expected that students will be able to:

- present ideas, arguments and information with clarity and reasonable accuracy both orally and in written form using appropriate academic register and conventions
- identify key information, comprehend texts at both sentence and paragraph level and make notes from listening and reading material.

## **ACADEMIC SKILLS**

The module aims to help students develop their study skills in order to be successful on the International Foundation Programme and as undergraduate students.

By the end of the module, it is expected that students will be able to:

- produce written work which is well-organised, relevant and makes use of appropriate terminology and academic style
- demonstrate good communication skills in written and/or oral form
- identify problems, apply their knowledge and skills in finding solutions and evaluate these solutions
- think critically, in order to recognise and express well-reasoned arguments in academic writing
- interpret and analyse a range of information beyond mere description
- work as a member of a team by cooperating with others, negotiating, listening to others in the group, sharing responsibilities/tasks and meeting deadlines.

## **QUALIFYING FOR YOUR DEGREE**

On successful completion of the IFP, you are guaranteed a place on your chosen degree at Reading, if you meet the progression requirements set out by the University departments for their degrees. These vary from degree to degree. See **reading.ac.uk/ifp-qualifyingdegree.aspx** 

If you do not meet these requirements, you may be able to progress to a degree at another UK university. Students from Reading IFP have gone onto degrees at universities such as Bath, Bristol, Durham, Nottingham and Southampton. Your Academic Tutor will provide assistance with applying to alternative universities.

## **HOW TO APPLY**

Applications can be made directly to the Admissions Office at the University of Reading or through UCAS. All application details can be found at: **reading.ac.uk/ifp-howtoapply.aspx** 

You will need to provide us with your up to date academic transcripts or grades, a reference and a short personal statement explaining why you want to join the IFP at Reading and what it is that you hope to study for your degree. Fees for both tuition and accommodation can be paid in full at the start of the programme or in instalments as agreed by the university.
